Established the Butabika Recovery College, the only Recovery College on the African continent

Informal peer support, initial proposals

Bringing service users on board to audit

Recovery training with hospital **community Psychiatry** nurse team

Recovery model training support from East London NHS trust

Support by people previously experienced in service user involvement.

Reciprocal exchange and skills transfer between UK and Uganda



Lessons learned

Possible for service users to work alongside health care teams as PSW to enhance recovery of people with severe enduring mental disorders

Trained peer support workers (PSW)

Created a handbook for PSW in Uganda

Documented and shared recovery stories of Peer Support Workers

Brought Peer Support Work onto the psychiatric wards

Introduced Peer Support Work to other regions of Uganda



This approach may improve understanding of recovery, foster a sense of purpose and reduce stigma

There is urgent need to evaluate impact of peer support in mental health care

There is need to study the economic implications of peer support work for individuals, health systems and nations.




